About

Purpose and Activities

The foundation makes grants to program-related, nonprofit research institutions to promote research in chemistry and life sciences, broadly interpreted, to foster the invention of methods, instruments, and materials that will open new avenues of research in science.

Background

Incorporated in 1977 in CA - Founded by the late Arnold and Mabel Beckman. Arnold Beckman founded Beckman Instruments in 1935 with the production of a pH meter he invented. A forerunner of modern electrochemical instrumentation, the scientific instrument simplified and expedited acidity and alkalinity measurements. Beckman Instruments grew to become one of the world's leading suppliers of instruments to the health care market. In 1981, Beckman merged with SmithKline Corporation of Philadelphia to form SmithKline Beckman Corporation. In 1989, Beckman became independent again.

Program Areas (7)

Arnold O. Beckman Postdoctoral Fellows Program

The purpose of the Arnold O. Beckman Postdoctoral Fellows Award is to initiate and support post-Ph.D., -M.D. or -M.D./Ph.D. postdoctoral fellows at research institutions across the United States, who are judged to have the highest potential for success in an academic career in chemistry and the life sciences, and who will become the next generation of leaders and innovators in science, engineering, and technology. It is the foundation's intent that the Arnold O. Beckman Postdoctoral Fellowship will be the catalyst to aid in the fellow's transition to an outstanding, independent research career.

Beckman Scholars Program

Established in 1997, The Beckman Scholars Program is an invited program for accredited universities and four-year colleges in the United States. It provides scholarships that contribute significantly in advancing the education, research training and personal development of select students in chemistry, biochemistry, and the biological and medical sciences. The sustained, in-depth undergraduate research experiences and comprehensive faculty mentoring are unique in terms of program scope, content and level of scholarship awards (\$19,300 for two summers and one academic year).

Beckman Science Program

The primary purpose of the program is assisting Orange County elementary schools in the enhancement of science education. This funding will stimulate schools to teach science as a core subject in grades K-6, so that a passion for scientific exploration can be passed on to a new generation of curious minds. For many it will be the beginning of a lifelong affinity for things scientific and a start to a life dedicated to extending the boundaries of science and technology. The program operates in five main domains: 1) Providing professional development for elementary, K-6 teachers; 2) Offering materials support for teachers using science kits; 3) Working with individual school districts through the foundation's incentive grants; 4) Evaluating the success of the program and student achievement; and 5) Educating the community about the need for science education through community outreach.

Beckman Young Investigators Program

The program is intended to provide research support to the most promising young faculty members in the early stages of academic careers in the chemical and life sciences. The program is open to persons with tenure-track appointments in academic and nonprofit institutions that conduct fundamental research in the chemical and life sciences. Candidates must be citizens or permanent residents of the United States at the time of application. Documentation of U.S. citizenship (copy of birth certificate or passport) or permanent residency status must be provided with the application. Persons who have applied for permanent residency but have not received their government documentation by the time of application are not eligible. To be eligible, an applicant should not have completed more than five full years in his or her tenure-track or other comparable independent research appointment. Regardless of eligibility under this rule, no individual may apply for a Beckman Young Investigator award more than three times. Projects should show promise for contributing to significant advances in the research fields of interest to the foundation. They should represent innovative departures in research rather than extensions or expansions of existing programs. Proposed research that cuts across traditional boundaries of scientific disciplines is encouraged. Projects are normally funded for a period of four years. Grants are normally in the range of \$750,00 over the term of the project. The foundation does not provide for overhead or for indirect costs. Funding will not be considered for the following: general institutional expenses, general fundraising campaign expenses such as dinners and mass mailings, as a contribution to unified funds or to a pooled fund that is itself used to award grants of any kind, or social science, religious, political, or other research that does not fall within the foundation's areas of interest, as described above. Applicants must complete an online Letter of Intent Form. See foundation web site for complete application information.

Beckman-Argyros Award in Vision Research

The Beckman-Argyros Award in Vision Research is intended to reward one individual who has made significant transformative breakthroughs in vision research; this may include those whose contributions to science in general, or through the development of an innovative technology or fundamental scientific breakthrough have been applied to, aided and/or improved the vision sciences. The recipient of the Beckman-Argyros Award will receive a total of \$500,000, as outlined below, along with a solid gold commemorative medallion: \$100,000 prize to award recipient; \$400,000 grant to support award recipient's research at a university or other qualifying public 501 (c)(3) charity specifying its designated use.

Employee Matching Gifts

About

Purpose and Activities

The Barr Foundation's mission is to invest in human, natural, and creative potential, serving as thoughtful stewards and catalysts. Based in Boston, Barr focuses regionally, and selectively engages nationally, working in partnership with nonprofits, foundations, the public sector, and civic and business leaders to elevate the arts and creative expression, to advance solutions for climate change, and to connect all students to success in high school and beyond. Founded in 1997, Barr now has assets of \$1.7 billion, and has contributed more than \$838 million to charitable causes since being founded.

Background

Established in 1987 in MA - Founded by Amos B. Hostetter, Jr., a cable television pioneer and the founder of Continental Cablevision, which was acquired by MediaOne and is now a subsidiary of Comcast. He is currently the chairman of Pilot House Associates, LLC, a family investment office.

Program Areas (6)

Arts and Creativity

Elevating the arts and enabling creative expression to engage and inspire a dynamic, thriving Massachusetts. Great art transforms the way we engage with the world. It brings beauty into our lives. Through creativity we can transcend conventions and generate new ideas, alternatives, and possibilities. Arts and creativity have the power to connect us with each other, to help us understand our dynamic environment, and to imagine new, better, different futures. Against a backdrop of rapidly changing demographics, technological advancements, and evolving art forms, Barr's Arts & Creativity program seeks to invest in bold ideas and leaders. Our overarching goal is to elevate the arts and enable creative expression to engage and inspire a dynamic, thriving Massachusetts. We will pursue this goal through three strategies: advancing the field's capacity to adapt, take risks, and engage changing audiences in new ways; fostering opportunities to connect the arts to other disciplines and sectors; and activating public support for the arts.

Climate

Climate change is real. It is happening. It is accelerating. All over the world, people are experiencing its effects. And these are becoming more devastating every year—a trend that can be checked only through dramatic, global effort. While climate change is a global challenge, cities, states, and regions have become vital agents of leadership. We believe breakthroughs and progress will continue coming from the ground up and that Barr can help catalyze and advance solutions and leadership across our region in ways that also spur broader action. On occasion, we engage in targeted national or global efforts with significant opportunities to contribute to impact. Yet our principal geographic focus is the U.S. Northeast. We focus our mitigation efforts on the two areas that produce the most greenhouse gas emissions: 1) how we generate and use energy; and 2) how we move around. In addition, we acknowledge that even with concerted efforts to mitigate the impacts of climate change, they are inevitable. Coastal cities such as Boston are particularly vulnerable. Our Climate Resilience focus area aims to increase the capacity of Metro Boston communities to prepare for and adapt to the impacts of climate change. To learn more about our Climate strategies and grantmaking priorities, explore our Clean Energy, Mobility, and Climate Resilience focus areas below.

Closing Education Opportunity Gaps

The foundation's major emphases are on early education, the Boston Public School system, and out-of-school time. Its overarching education goal is to close education opportunity gaps in Boston so that public school achievement is no longer predicted by demographics or address.

Cross-Program Initiatives

As a complement to our core programs of Arts & Creativity, Climate, and Education, Barr supports a range of activities to reinforce the strategies guiding that work and to deepen our commitment to the region. Cross-Program Initiatives focuses on three broad goals: 1. Invest in leaders. 2. Inform sound decision-making. 3. Support infrastructure for the nonprofit and philanthropic sectors.

Education

New England's secondary schools have done a good job for many students, but we can do a great job for all. Too many New England students need remediation in college despite receiving a high school diploma. Others find it hard to connect to meaningful post-graduation opportunities. Schools must change because the world students live in has changed and so have the knowledge and skills necessary for success in life. The Barr Foundation partners with others to rethink secondary education and build a variety of new school models that fit the needs and strengths of their own community to bring greater

success to all students. Rather than focus on one approach, we encourage many that are intentionally designed to engage students through their interests and empower them with content knowledge, successful habits, creative know-how, and navigation abilities—the integrated knowledge and skills all young people need to connect with success in college, career, and community.

Mitigating Climate Change

To demonstrate how to meet aggressive targets for reducing greenhouse gas emissions (and to do so equitably), Barr invests in large-scale efforts to help cities and towns make their buildings more energy efficient. It also supports work to improve the links between where people live, work, learn and play, and to make all forms of transportation – driving, biking, walking, public transit – safer and more affordable, accessible, and efficient. In this work, its primary focus is the Commonwealth's metro areas. However, given the global nature of this challenge, and the diversity of cities and towns exhibiting real leadership, it also invests in select statewide, regional, and national efforts.

About

Purpose and Activities

The foundation promotes progressive social change by supporting grassroots organizations that utilize community organizing strategies to advance social and environmental justice.

Background

Established in 1985 in NY - Founded by Bennett "Ben" Cohen, the co-founder of the Ben & Jerry's ice cream company. Born in Brooklyn, New York and raised in the town of Merrick on Long Island, Cohen first met and befriended his future business partner, Jerry Greenfield, in a junior high school gym class in 1963. The two men opened Ben & Jerry's Homemade Ice Cream Parlor in Burlington, Vermont, in 1977. Cohen turned his new-found wealth and prominence toward a variety of social causes, generally through the Ben & Jerry's Foundation, which receives 7.5% of all Ben & Jerry's pre-tax profits. Cohen resigned as Chief Executive Officer in 1996, and has not been actively involved with the company since the Unilever acquisition in 2000, apart from his membership on the advisory board.

Program Areas (6)

Employee Matching Gift Program

The foundation matches contributions made by employees of Ben & Jerry's to nonprofit organizations on a one-for-one basis up to \$2,000 per employee, per year.

Grassroots Organizing for Social Change Program

The Grassroots Organizing for Social Change Program supports non-profit grassroots, constituent-led organizations across the country that are using direct action, grassroots community-organizing strategies to accomplish their goals. The foundation awards grants of up to \$25,000 to proposals that are aligned with its broad interests in social justice, environmental justice, and socially just food systems.

National Movement Building Grant Program

The foundation supports large organizations working across sectors and implementing approaches, knowledge, and models that build Social Justice Movements nationally and lead to positive change. This program is by invitation only.

Vermont Capacity Building Grant Program

The foundation supports Vermont statewide nonprofit organizations working toward broad systemic change for the betterment of Vermont, with emphasis on social justice, environmental protection, family farms and local food systems. Grants can be used for consultation, technology, organizational developmental work, infrastructure development, staff development, or staff needs. Grants of up to \$30,000 are awarded.

Vermont Community Action Teams Program (CATs)

The foundation awards grants of up to \$2,000 to local community organizations providing services, activities, and events with emphasis on under-served populations, including seniors, at-risk youth, and low income communities; basic human needs and the needs of underserved areas of the state; volunteer-led organizations; organizations with demonstrated support of their community; and programs and groups that might not have access to more mainstream sources of support. The program is administered by Vermont Community Action Teams comprised of non-management employees of Ben & Jerry's.

Purpose and Activities

The purpose of the foundation is to help young people of exceptional promise reach their full potential through education.

Background

Established in 1997 in VA. The foundation became active in 2000 - Founded by the late Jack Kent Cooke who was a businessman, sportsman, and philanthropist. His most well-known business interests included ownership of professional sports teams such as the NBA's Los Angeles Lakers, the NHL's Los Angeles Kings, and the NFL's Washington Redskins. He also owned a thoroughbred racing farm in Lexington, Kentucky. Numbered among his other businesses were newspapers, magazines, radio stations, cable television, and real estate holdings, including the Chrysler Building in New York City.

Program Areas (11)

Advance Learning

Through its Advanced Learning grants, the foundation is increasing enrollment and success of low-income and minority students in high school Advanced Placement courses.

Artistic Advancement

The foundation recognizes that musically talented youth from low-income families often lack the funding for private lessons, master classes, quality instruments, summer programs, and performance experiences. The "Widening the Stage" grant initiative aims to expand access to advanced music instruction for talented young musicians, ages 8-18, from low-income backgrounds. Grants up to \$250,000, help provide free or low-cost rigorous training through community music schools, conservatory or college preparatory programs, and summer programs to allow low-income, musically talented youth to reach their full music potential.

College Scholarship Program

The program is an undergraduate scholarship program available to high-achieving high school seniors with financial need who seek to attend and graduate from the nation's best four-year colleges and universities. Selected from a nationwide pool of applicants, up to 40 students will become Jack Kent Cooke Scholars and have access to funding up to \$40,000 per year to attend a four-year accredited undergraduate school. The application is available to students only during their senior year. The application is open from early Sept. through early Nov. The applications are reviewed Dec. through Feb., and final notifications are made in mid-Mar. The student application is an online form to be completed by the applicant.

Good Neighbor Grants

The program was established to identify and strengthen ties with youth-serving nonprofit organizations in the Northern Virginia, metropolitan Washington, DC, and Maryland areas that are helping students with significant financial need reach their fullest potential through education. Selected grantees will receive a one-time grant of between \$10,000 - \$35,000 that may be used over a one-year period. Funding is intended for application towards specific project or program-based costs. See web site for eligibility requirements, proposal form and deadlines.

Grants to Individuals Program

Financial assistance and academic support to outstanding high school undergraduate and graduate students. No graduate scholarships awarded (except to students who have already been awarded undergraduate scholarships by the foundation).

Summer Enrichment Program

Through this program the foundation awards grants up to \$250,000 per year to nonprofit organizations or universities who provide access to high-quality summer enrichment programs for high-achieving low-income students entering grades 6 through 12.

Talent Development Award

This award recognizes exemplary practices that transform high-potential, economically disadvantaged elementary and middle school students into high achievers. The award is a one-time \$500,000 grant intended to catalyze an organization's work, bring strategies to a broader scale, and amplify conversations around one approach to cultivating potential. The award is open to tax-exempt public university or public charity 501(c)(3) not-for-profit organizations. Applicant organization must provide educational services to students in elementary and/or middle grades (K-8) through in-school or out-of-school time programming. Arts-based organizations serving K-8 students are eligible to apply.

Twice Exceptional Students

Twice-Exceptional Education grants are designed to ensure that extraordinary students who possess a high level of academic ability as well as learning differences receive necessary academic resources. While federal law mandates that students with learning disabilities receive educational assistance, no similar mandate exists to ensure that "twice-exceptional" students receive the extra academic challenges necessary to nurture their talents. The Twice-Exceptional Education Grants are designed to serve lower-income students with both kinds of exceptionalities.

Undergraduate Transfer Scholarship Program

This program honors excellence by supporting outstanding community college students with financial need as they transfer to and complete their bachelor's degrees at the nation's top four-year colleges and universities. The foundation selects approximately 85 deserving students each year and awards each scholar up to \$40,000 annually. Each award is intended to cover a significant share of the student's educational expenses – including tuition, living expenses, books and required fees – for the final two to three years necessary to achieve a bachelor's degree. Awards vary by individual, based on the cost of tuition as well as other grants or scholarships he or she may receive. The application process has two phases. The phase one application will include an online application and one online recommendation from a professor or instructor at applicant's community college. Selected applicants from phase one will be invited to submit additional information in phase two of the application process.

Young Artist Award

Each year the Top's Jack Kent Cooke Young Artist Award Program provides 20 outstanding young musicians who demonstrate financial need with a \$10,000 scholarship to advance their artistic development and education. Jack Kent Cooke Young Artists range from age 8 to 18 and hail from all across the United States and abroad. Applicants should be classical instrumentalists, vocalists, and composers (ages 8 to 18) who have not yet entered college during the academic year and must be interested in performing on From the Top, and demonstrate (in order of importance) exceptional musical achievement, unmet financial need, solid academic achievement, and strength of character. Young Scholars Program

The program enables high-ability middle and high school students with financial need to realize their full academic potential. Scholars receive comprehensive advising and financial support from the 8th grade through high school. Family income must not exceed \$95,000. The application is available to students only during their 7th grade year. The online application opens in mid-January and closes mid-March. The applications are reviewed April through August, and final notifications are made in early fall of the applicant's 8th grade year.

About

Purpose and Activities

The foundation is a family foundation dedicated to cultural freedom, diversity and creativity through projects which support exceptional contemporary artists and writers, as well as inspired Native activists in rural indigenous communities. The foundation recognizes the profound and often unquantifiable value of the creative process and is willing to take risks and make substantial investments in ambitious and experimental thinking. Believing that globalization threatens all cultures and ecosystems, the foundation is particularly interested in projects that encourage freedom of inquiry, imagination, and expression. The foundation supports this mission with long-term special projects requiring multi-year commitments of funding and technical assistance in the areas of contemporary visual art, literature, indigenous communities, and issues of cultural freedom.

Background

Established in 1960 in IL - In 1960 J. Patrick Lannan, Sr., entrepreneur and financier, established Lannan Foundation. A self-educated scholar and liberal thinker, he believed strongly in the social importance of charitable programs and in the cultural importance of innovative and controversial forms of visual and literary art. During his lifetime, Mr. Lannan assembled an extensive collection of contemporary and modern American and European art. Mr. Lannan died in 1983 at the age of 78. In 1986 Lannan Foundation received a substantial endowment from his estate. Under the leadership of J. Patrick Lannan, Jr., the foundation continued its expansion of the collection and instituted national programs for grantmaking in contemporary visual and literary arts

Program Areas (8)

Art Program

The goals of this funding area are to support the creativity of exceptional contemporary artists, foster serious criticism and discussion of contemporary art, and to bring new and experimental works of art to a wide audience. The program also includes the Acquisition and Exhibition programs. The Acquisition and Gift program enables the foundation to collect the work of contemporary artists as well as making gifts of their work to museums and other public institutions. The Exhibition program was established to support the creation of new work and to give greater exposure to contemporary artists.

Cultural Freedom Program

As defined by the foundation, cultural freedom is the right of individuals and communities to define and protect valued and diverse ways of life currently threatened by globalization. The prize recognizes people whose extraordinary and courageous work celebrates the human right to freedom of imagination, inquiry, and expression. The fellowship's purpose is to encourage and support individuals who are leaders in American and foreign communities to contemplate, reflect, write and study. The money provided with the fellowship may be used for travel, study, research, or other similar purposes. Applications and nominations for cultural freedom awards or fellowships are not accepted.

Grants to Individuals Program

Awards to writers writing in the English language, and grants to visual artists from indigenous communities promoting cultural freedom.

Indigenous Communities Program

The program supports the resolve of rural Native people to renew their communities through their own institutions and traditions. The program supports projects consistent with traditional values in the areas of environmental protection and advocacy, legal rights, language revitalization and preservation, education, and culture. Applications are accepted only from new grant requests from United States Federally recognized tribes or Native controlled 501 (c) (3) organizations whose work is solely focused in the United States.

Literary Program

The purpose of the program is to support the creation of exceptional poetry and prose written originally in the English language and to increase the audience for contemporary literature. The foundation honors writers whose work reflects and changes our understanding of the world. Applications and nominations for literary awards or fellowships are not accepted.

Program-Related Investment

The foundation has made a PRI in the form of a loan to a public policy organization to finance a book-publishing activity. Historically, the foundation has made PRIs in the form of a mortgage loan to an advocacy organization, as well as loans to a Native American organization. Historically, the foundation has also made PRIs to educational and cultural programs.

Readings and Conversations Program

The program invites writers, poets, and social activists to Santa Fe to read and discuss their work before an audience. Some events are simulcast on public radio and each is recorded and joins the Lannan Audio Archive which currently contains hundreds of hours of the audio recordings of these sell-out events.

Residency Program

The program in Marfa, Texas, provides uninterrupted writing time for poets, writers, essayists, scholars, art curators, and activists. Residency durations are usually from one to two months. Candidates for this program are selected through an internal nomination process. Unsolicited applications are not accepted.

About

Purpose and Activities

The David and Lucile Packard Foundation is a family foundation. The foundation works on the issues its founders cared about most: improving the lives of children, enabling the creative pursuit of science, advancing reproductive health, and conserving and restoring the earth's natural systems. The foundation invests in effective organizations and leaders, collaborates with them to identify strategic solutions, and supports them over time to reach its common goals.

Background

Incorporated in 1964 in CA - Founded by the late David and Lucile Packard, co-founders of Hewlett-Packard (HP). HP is a global corporation developing and manufacturing information technology such as data storage, networking hardware and a variety of other technological products. The Packards formalized their passion for philanthropy in 1964 when they established the David and Lucile Packard Foundation. They believed America to be the home of a unique type of organization—foundations—that constitute a great American tradition and complement government efforts to focus on society's needs. Today, their children and grandchildren continue to help guide the Foundation's work.

Program Areas (8)

Children, Families, and Communities (CFC)

The program works to ensure opportunities for all children to reach their potential by addressing two interrelated and fundamental needs that must be met for children to thrive: health and education. The focus areas are: 1) Early Learning. This program seeks to improve the quality of early learning and developmental experiences, in both formal and informal settings, for all children in California from birth through age five; 2) Children's Health Insurance. This program works to ensure that all children receive appropriate health care by creating nationwide systems that provide access to health insurance for all children; and 3) After-School and Summer Enrichment. This program aims to strengthen California's public commitment to school-based, after-school programs and to ensure that after-school and summer learning opportunities are fully integrated in to the education system.

Conservation and Science

The program invests in action and ideas that conserve and restore ecosystems while enhancing human well-being. It supports public policy reforms, changes in private sector practices, and scientific activities to develop essential knowledge and tools for addressing current and future priorities. Focus areas include: 1) Climate: Reducing emissions that contribute to environment-damaging climate change; 2) Oceans: Working toward healthy oceans that support a diversity and abundance of marine life which can withstand pressures over time, providing people and communities with food, stable livelihoods and economic, social and cultural benefits; 3) Land: Working to protect some of the continent's iconic natural treasures and remaining wilderness areas; 4) Science: Supporting efforts to gather fresh knowledge about the Earth's ecosystems and use these findings to generate creative solutions.

Local Grantmaking

The program supports an array of nonprofit organizations in geographic areas that are significant to the Packard family. These include the five California counties that surround the Foundation's headquarters in Los Altos, California: San Mateo, Santa Clara, Santa Cruz, Monterey, and San Benito, as well as Pueblo, Colorado, the birthplace of David Packard. The goal in supporting these communities is to help make them stronger and more vibrant places where all families can thrive and reach their potential. To achieve this goal, the Local Grantmaking program focuses its resources on addressing six fundamental issue areas: 1) Arts; 2) Children and Youth; 3) Conservation and Science; 4) Food and Shelter; 5) Population and Reproductive Health; 6) Beyond the Check.

Matching Gifts

All foundation employees are eligible to have their gifts to public charities, schools, colleges and other 501(c)(3) organizations matched by the foundation. The gifts may range from \$35 to \$10,000 per calendar year.

Organizational Effectiveness and Philanthropy Funds

The program supports grantees to help them build core strengths in areas like strategic and business planning, financial management, board and executive leadership, and communications. It also makes grants to build these capacities among groups of leaders and cohorts of grantees, through initiatives called Partnership Projects —so that nonprofit leaders can share knowledge, learn from their peers, and grow their networks. Partnership Projects are grants focused on groups of leaders and cohorts of grantees. They are developed as a collaboration between Organizational Effectiveness and programs at the foundation, grantees and, when possible, other funders, and are designed to allow grantees to strengthen organizational capacity and learn from and connect with their peers.

Population and Reproductive Health

The program seeks to promote women's reproductive health and rights and to stabilize population growth. The program supports efforts to expand access to and improve the quality of essential services, including comprehensive sexuality education, voluntary family planning/contraception, and safe abortion. It focuses its efforts in South Asia, Sub-Saharan Africa, and the United States. In each region, it makes grants to strengthen service delivery, build leadership and advocacy capacity, and shift social and cultural norms that prevent women and youth from seeking the services they need to make healthy reproductive decisions. The foundation uses the evidence and experience it collects to forge partnerships with global research and advocacy organizations, especially youth-led networks, and to shape the discourse at the regional and global levels. .

Program-Related Investment

The foundation has made PRIs in the form of loans, guarantees and equity within its program areas when organizations can demonstrate that repayment will be forthcoming. Historically, the foundation has made PRIs to support a range of activities including acquisition of land for environmental conservation purposes, acquisition and/or construction of grantee and nonprofit facilities, and implementation of grantee program- and mission-driven ventures.

Scholarship Program: The Packard Fellowships for Science and Engineering

In 1988, the Packard Foundation established the Packard Fellowships for Science and Engineering to allow the nation's most promising professors to pursue science and engineering research early in their careers with few funding restrictions and limited reporting requirements. The program arose out of David Packard's commitment to strengthening university-based science and engineering programs in recognition that the success of the Hewlett-Packard Company, which he cofounded, derived in large measure from the research and development in university laboratories. Established in 1990 in GA - Founded by R.E. "Ted" Turner III, the businessman and activist who founded cable television network CNN in 1980, which became the first dedicated 24-hour cable news channel. Turner also founded the cable channels TNT (in 1998), and Turner Classic Movies (in 1994). In 1986 he established Turner Entertainment Co. to oversee film properties that he owned, and also started Turner Broadcasting System, Inc. (TBS) which is the company managing the collection of cable networks and properties he started in the mid-1970's. In addition, Mr. Turner is the founder of The Goodwill Games, and in 1991 he was named Time Magazine's Man of the Year. In 1998 he made headlines by announcing a \$1 billion donation to the United Nations. Ted Turner has committed to The Giving Pledge, and has pledged to give away at least half of his wealth to philanthropy

Creating Solutions for Sustainable Living
